

#### **HEAR OUR SPECTRUM OF VOICES**



### I. Definition

- Advocacy means giving a person **support to have their voice heard**. It is a service aimed at helping people understand their rights and express their views.
- Advocating for policies and programs in support of individuals and families with autism

Ideally, parents lay the groundwork for self-advocacy when the child is young. An important precondition for successful self-advocacy and disclosure is self-awareness. People with ASD need to understand how autism affects their interactions with others and the environment. Also, they need to be familiar with their strengths and challenges. A parent or caretaker can do this with a child from a very early age. In fact, the earlier a child has an explanation about his differences, the better off he will be.


### **II. Importance of Advocacy**

Advocacy seeks to ensure that all people in society are able to:

Protect and promote their rights


- AUTISM AWARENESS
- Have their views and wishes genuinely considered when decisions are being made about their lives
- Express their views, thoughts and concerns
- Access information, advice and guidance





# III. Convention on the Rights of the Child (1989) (Art.5)

"States Parties shall respect the responsibilities, rights and duties of parents or, where applicable, the members of the extended family or community as provided for by local custom, legal guardians or other persons legally responsible for the child, to provide, in a manner consistent with the evolving capacities of the child, appropriate direction and guidance in the exercise by the child of the rights recognized in the present Convention."



### IV. Different groups involved in Advocacy Parents Associations

- Advocacy for the child with autism takes a parent through processes of learning.
- serves parents well in getting the services needed
- navigate the maze of system and social services for a child with ASD
- development of skills that assist in the acquisition of services
- acquiring knowledge about their rights

Support advocacy organizations


**PROTECTION**

### **V. Steps to Effective Advocacy**

- Decide what is best for your child
- Educate yourself about relevant policy and laws
- Talk to autism experts
- Evaluate all the information
- Ask for a meeting and present your case
- Share your experience being a parent of a child with Autism

# TIPS TO ECOME AN EFFECTIVE ADVOCATE FOR YOUR CHILDREN

- 1 DON'T WAIT FOR RESOURCES.
- BECOME AN EXPERT ON THE DIAGNOSIS.
- 3 KEEP HARD COPIES OF EVERYTHING.
- FIND HELP IN THE APPROPRIATE PLACES.
- 5 KNOW YOUR CHILD'S RIGHTS
- 6 BE INVOLVED IN THE IEP PROCESS.

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### VI. Things to consider before you start



- What are you hoping to accomplice
- What laws and facts support your position
- Do you advocate to someone who has the authority to grand your request
